Registered Apprenticeship bridges the gap between the world of work and the education system by blending classroom instruction with practical, on-the-job training.

What is Registered Apprenticeship?

Registered Apprenticeship is full-time, paid employment and training with career placement built in. It allows you to work as an apprentice to a skilled employee in your chosen field so you can learn the industry and earn a paycheck while your learning. Apprentices are paid on a progressive pay scale that increases as skills increase. This is especially important to people who cannot afford to leave the labor force to enter training.

What industries need apprentices?

There is a wide range of apprenticeable occupations in Kentucky, including careers in construction, advanced manufacturing, transportation, energy, health care and utilities. These industries apply progressive concepts in electronics, computers, software, automation and work methods to improve production and enhance their global competitiveness. Apprenticeable occupations in energy and advanced manufacturing are projected to experience growth and often pay above-average wages.

Yes. In addition to hands-on training while earning a paycheck—in effect, an industry scholarship—you have the opportunity to complete relevant training with the possibility of college credit as you work toward attaining your Certificate of Completion.

What are the requirements of the program?
